One Lexington Mentoring Collective Increases Girls Groups:

The coverage for ONE Lexington's It Takes a Village In-School Mentoring Program has expanded this year to 21 groups in 17 different schools. Special shoutout to Evanyhoney Romero of Rhema Word Foundation (and volunteer Zina Merkin) for facilitating a girls group at Winburn Middle School called, PEARL Girls. This group met weekly this semester and talked about conflict resolution, bystander awareness, financial literacy, gun violence, and much more! These are the types of partnerships on the community level that it takes to truly address the root causes of gun violence in our community. Incredible work young queens!













Black Men Of Lexington United Event In June:

For the 4th time in 3 years, One Lexington is calling all Black Men of Lexington to come together as the city continues its efforts to address community violence. The cycle of violence disproportionately affects young men of color; therefore, we want to get more men of color involved in the prevention process. On June 29th, from 10 am to 12 pm, we will be convening at a location at the Farish Theater and listening to a panel of single mothers and grandparents talk about the need for more accessible mentors in the community for their children. Also, present will be FCPS registering men who want to volunteer in the school system, community partners looking for male volunteers/mentors, and other resources for those wanting to get involved with our youth. One Lexington FRYSC Grant Supports Mary Tood Elementary School:

Back in February of 2022, One Lexington, in collaboration with Cities United and the University of Kentucky CLD, brought together individuals from the public and private sectors to build our One Lexington Strategic Plan. A citywide plan to combat gun violence in Lexington over the next 4 years. That strategic plan is based on a national model called, P.I.E.R., which stands for Prevention, Intervention, Enforcement, & Re-Entry. Our FRYSC Violence Prevention Donations goal is to fund events, services, and programs that focus on the Intervention and prevention pillars of the P.I.E.R. model. ONE Lexington's mission is to leverage government resources and community partnerships to reduce gun violence impacting youth and young adults (ages 10-29). We hope that this donation is the first step in living up to that mandate and empowering schools to stand up against gun violence in our community. Below is a report from the staff at Mary Tood Elementary School on how they used the funding this school year!

The Day of the Child, celebrated on April 30, is a nationally known program that promotes the value and healthy habit of reading among all children, regardless of their socioeconomic status and cultural background. It connects kids and their families and introduces them to the world of books, languages, and cultures. It is also known as 'El Dia de los Niños' or 'El Dia de los Libros' (Children's Day or Book Day). The holiday stresses the importance of literacy among children no matter where they come from. Since 1925, Mexico has commemorated Children's Day every year. Because children are seen as valuable members of society, the day emphasizes the necessity of loving, accepting, and respecting them. Teachers plan a day for their students on this day (or the nearest weekday if it occurs on a weekend), which includes games, music, and food sharing

One Lexington Attended CivicLex's "Civic Day":

Civic Day held at Pam Miller Art Center last week involved 6 high schools. Students started at the beginning of the school year researching issues in their communities. Each school had an Expo where they met with several different community partners and businesses to see how they would collaborate with them. ONE Lex tabled each expo and followed up with Bryan Station and Henry Clay High Schools through a group meeting/chat to discuss further. These discussions included research and interview questions so that the students could have a better understanding of how to address their concerns/issues. During the Civic Day students had a designated booth and Community Advisors went to each table and listened to their presentations. Below is some more formal information on ho this amazing program started: In 2021, CivicLex acquired a grant to work with Generation Citizen for a community-wide civic education initiative. By that fall, CivicLex had reached out to Fayette County Public Schools to develop a plan to merge all three of the partners' resources to achieve the goal of creating a more civically engaged community.







Throughout the 2022-23 school year, a cohort of six Fayette County government teachers across each traditional high school spent time collaborating with CivicLex and aligning the curriculum to the Kentucky Academic Standards for Social Studies. In Fall 2023, the first Civic Expos were held across the high schools, connecting students with local leaders and community organizations. The Civics Expos are in-house field trips held throughout the Fall 2023 semester across high schools in Lexington. At each Expo, anywhere from 20-40 community partners would be in attendance across various fields: public safety, city council, libraries, planning, animal rescue, advocacy groups, and more. During the Expo, students would engage firsthand with community partners, learning about the various organizations and civic roles across Lexington, as well as programs and ways they can be involved as students. From there, each school had a group of students select a topic of interest and importance to them, based on the interactions from the Civics Expos, to research and present their ideas at Civics Day.
