One Lexington Story On How Community Partnerships Save Lives

Last week I was contacted by the executive director of the Lexington Housing Authority Austin Sims about some issues involving juveniles at a few of his properties. Young boys and girls between the ages of 8-13 have been engaging in physical altercations, vandalizing local businesses, and trespassing on neighboring properties. Mr. Sims had heard about the work of One Lexington and wanted to find ways to collaborate on engaging these young people and supporting families. Many of these families are already in financial and even emotional deficit, and with so many moving parts to these incidents, accountability, and resolution can be tough to secure. This leaves the Housing Authority and property managers with only one course of action which is eviction. If evicted, residents can not obtain public housing for 3 years. Many of these families may already be struggling, and an eviction will make things more difficult. So our team met with them to figure out ways that we could help.

What we found in our work of addressing youth & young adult gun violence in Lexington, is that most of the conflicts are interpersonal and start prior to a gun entering the equation. Arguments on social media, music beefs, bullying on the bus, or even physical fights at school are often the origins of deadly conflicts. Our commitment to the "prevention" part of our "P.I.E.R." model encourages us to mediate conflicts or intervene in problematic behaviors in the early stages so that it doesn't lead to gun violence. With that in mind, One Lexington offered to provide a "diversion" type of program for families facing eviction due to juvenile activity. Families would be required to work with One Lexington for a period of time in which they could work their way back in good standing. One Lexington and its crisis response coordinators would also do regular engagement walks at properties having the most issues and engaging youth directly to not only deter bad behavior but to build relationships and connections.





One Lexington Story On How Community Partnerships Save Lives

After leaving the meeting, I went to one of the properties where a majority of the incidents involving juveniles have taken place and I encountered a group of boys hanging out. I got out of my car, walked up to them, and introduced myself. Asked them where they went to school and I told them that I may be in the building this year facilitating a mentoring program. I shook their hands, told them to be safe, and that I hoped to see them later on in the upcoming school year. Later that evening, I got a message on FB from a woman telling me to reach out to her friend who is a single mother of 2 teenage boys and is struggling to control them. I reached out to the mother directly and scheduled a home visit the following morning. When Kenneth and I arrived we noticed that she lived in the same property Mr. Sims acknowledged as a place where many of the incidents involving youth have occurred. As we began talking to the mother and devising a plan for her and her 2 boys, 1 of her sons walked into the room. He looks at me and says, "I know you!" Indeed he did, as this was one of the boys I came across the day before when riding through the neighborhood. Instantly, his guard dropped and a connection was made.

This all happened happened over the course of a 24-hour period. To the uninformed, all of this may seem like a lucky coincidence, but for those of us fully committed to this work, we know better. These types of organic and connected opportunities to serve happen almost every day in our work. Our violence prevention ecosystem stays open to the 3 C's: Communication, Coordination, and Collaboration. This cross-sector, all hearts on deck approach closes the gaps that our most vulnerable neighbors fall between and creates opportunities for us to serve. If it takes a village to raise a child, it takes a village to lose one. We all have a part to play in this fight to address gun violence in our community. His is one of the many stories we look to share in our bi-weekly reports moving forward.





It Takes a Village Summer Youth Program Concludes:

This summer One Lexington engaged 50 or more Lexington teenagers, many who have been directly impacted by gun violence, as a part of our weekly It Takes a Village Summer Youth Program. This summer our participants have learned about conflict resolution, mindfulness, navigating personal trauma, mental health awareness, financial literacy, effects of substance use, the history of hip hop, and much more! We also partnered with Andrews Brothers Counseling each Tuesday morning for group trauma informed-care sessions. Many of our youth have been directly impacted by gun violence and several families have requested additional counseling services for their children with the Andrews Brothers. 100 percent of are participants were on free or reduced lunch and over 65 percent of our participants lived in single-parent homes. Through our summer program this year, our staff and community partners were able to mediate conflicts, provide wrap-around services for immediate family members, relocate families, connect youth to extended mental health support, and more!

Help Wanted for It Takes a Village In-School Mentoring Program:

One Lexington is currently building its roster of community partners for our It **Takes a Village In-School Mentoring Collective.** Some of you have worked with us in the past and some of you have shown interest in working with us in the future. As we prepare for the 2023-24 school year, I'd like to share a little bit about this collective. The collective is made up of different individuals and organizations who facilitate weekly, in-school mentoring programs in middle or high school in FCPS. We work directly with the schools who identify 10-20 students who are dealing with challenges that may leave them more susceptible to the cycle of gun violence; **poverty, parental incarceration, inconsistent family structure, food insecurity, trauma, behavior challenges in previous school year, or have been directly affected by gun violence.**

Our model is to provide this group of students with in-school support each week, focusing on topics and discussions that teachers may not have the bandwidth to cover in the classroom. Group topics could consist of things such as conflict resolution, financial literacy, breaking generational curses, career readiness, entrepreneurship, mental health, mindfulness, dating violence, diversity & inclusion, gun violence, and more.

Bystander Awareness Day At Legends Baseball Game:


