Responding To Communities Affected By Gun Violence:

The city of Lexington has seen an increase in gun violence activity over the last month, with at least 12 nonfatal shootings, 2 homicides, and several shots fired calls. This creates long days and nights for our One Lexington team and its community partners as we look to physically respond to any shooting incident where affected parties fall into our age purview of 10-29. Over the last week, our team visited the Hollow Creek area, responded to the scene of a fatal shooting on Delaware, worked with FCPS in response to a middle school student witnessing his dad being shot, attended a press conference on Winchester Road to support business owners and community members following the mass shooting 2 weeks ago, and began community engagement in the Gainsway

and Centre Parkway areas. Over the last 3

weeks alone, we've contacted community members for mental health support, temporary housing, relocation opportunities, youth mentoring, and domestic violence services. While our ultimate goal is to prevent violence before it happens, we as a city must respond and support our neighbors once violence already happens, so that trauma doesn't perpetuate a cycle of hopelessness and future violence. 

National CVI Action Plan Revealed:

As many of you know, One Lexington uses **Cure Violence & CVI** as base models for our city's strategic plan to address youth & young adult gun violence. Many of you have joined us or partnered with us in those community-based efforts. The nationwide CVI action plan was recently released for 2024 and it's encouraging to see much of the work being done by YOU, being present in this plan. The CVI Action Plan strives to save lives, reduce violence in Black and brown communities, and support CVI workers who have committed their livelihoods to ending violence. For the first time, stakeholders from every part of the CVI ecosystem came together to create a groundbreaking community-led vision for the field, set ambitious goals, and refine essential strategies. The result is a set of high-priority opportunities that will catalyze philanthropic and public investment for years to come. For the past year, leaders from Community Justice, the Health Alliance for Violence Intervention (HAVI), and The National Institute for Criminal Justice Reform (NICJR) served as coordinators for the report seeking input and guidance from the CVI field. In May 2024, leaders from the Community-based Public Safety Collective (CBPS Collective) and the Urban Peace Institute joined the coordinating committee. This report is the start of a framework to take action on existing and new work for the CVI field.

The Community Violence Intervention Leadership Academy (CVILA) is a first-of-its-kind education program designed to deepen the leadership and management practices of senior CVI leaders so they can effectively manage community-based organizations and implement CVI strategies at scale. Its purpose is to provide senior CVI leaders with five months of hands-on education, to achieve its two interconnected goals: reducing gun violence and scaling the CVI field. The CVILA supports participants in achieving these goals by strengthening their leadership and management skills, expanding their networks, and supporting them in their efforts to elevate and advocate for the CVI field. The curriculum combines classroom instruction with immersive learning labs. During the first cohort, CVILA students participated in immersive learning labs in Chicago, New York, and Oakland hosted by UCAN, LIFE Camp, and Live Free USA, respectively.

Last month, the Governor's office announced a half-a-million-dollar grant to One Lexington through the state's **Everybody Counts** program. We are utilizing this funding through our "Building Bridges to Opportunity" initiative, including expanded scholarship opportunities for students of color, skills scholarships for all students affected by gun violence, and more. \$150,000 of that money has been set aside to supplement mental health costs for students, parents, and immediate family members affected by gun violence! That resource is available now!

Our ultimate goal with this program is "building" bridges to opportunity for our city's most vulnerable students. Rapid Housing Referrals for LHA Properties:

Effective immediately, the Lexington Housing Authority (LHA) will accept referrals from community/social service partners for specific LHA units. LHA has received approval from HUD to offer units that have been vacant for 90+ days to households that meet eligibility requirements. These units may be older but will meet HUD standards for safe, sanitary, and desirable housing. Candidates for these units will meet any of the following criteria, in addition to meeting the program and income guidelines for the property:

Household pays more than 30% of their adjusted income toward rent and utilities Households who are homeless or at risk of homelessness.

LHA is a Moving to Work (MTW) agency and LHA is allowed to waive certain HUD regulations to meet any one of three statutory objectives: to reduce costs and achieve greater cost-effectiveness in federal expenditures; to give incentives to families with children; and, to increase housing choices for low-income families. Once a referral is received an application packet will be sent for the applicant to complete or the applicant may schedule an appointment to come into an LHA office to complete the application.
