The CDBG funded owner-occupied housing rehabilitation program committed to complete 8 units and completed 3 units. Also 2 units that were The emergency repair program which provides deferred loans up to \$8,500 to assist low-income homeowners for emergency repairs of started during the previous reporting period were completed by the program. A total of 5 units were completed this reporting period. electrical, plumbing, heating, air conditioning systems, and accessibility issues assisted 30 households.

the program year to assist 30 people. Out of those 30 people, 4 were able to obtain permanent housing and 11 were assisted with prevention to New Beginnings Bluegrass, Inc. was awarded \$54,000 in CDBG funds for provision of a housing navigator to provide services to individuals with serious mental illnesses transitioning from institutional living situations to permanent housing. CDBG funds of over \$40,800 were spent during maintain housing. Arbor Youth Services, Inc. was awarded \$50,000 in CDBG funds to operate an Outreach Center for young adults, ages 18-24, that are homeless or at risk of homelessness. The center assisted 274 young adults this program year and over \$64,250 in CDBG funds were expended.

A \$1,242,903 construction contract for public improvements on Highlawn Ave. from Bluegrass Ave. to end of street, Gutherie Alley from first turn to Highlawn Ave., and Bolser Ave. from Highlawn Ave. to Gracelawn Ave. was executed in July 2021. In April 2022, the next phase of the project was added to the contract which includes public improvements on Bluegrass Ave. from Bryan Ave. to Highlawn Ave. During the program year \$385,735 in CDBG funds were expensed on construction of these phases; which includes replacement of curbs, gutters, sidewalks, street reconstruction, and storm sewer improvements. These phases were completed in December 2023.

Bluegrass Ave. was executed in August 2023. In November 2023, the next phase of the project was added to the contract which includes public North Limestone to Loneta Ave. and continue to the end of Loneta Ave. During the program year \$8,000 was spent in CDBG funds for design of construction of these phases; which includes replacement of curbs, gutters, sidewalks, street reconstruction, and storm sewer improvements. A \$764,812 construction contract for public improvements for the next phase of the project which includes McCloy Alley from Locust Ave. to construction will be completed in December 2024. The next phase will be bid in the fall of 2024. This phase will include Rosemary Ave. from Over \$473,479 of local sewer funds were leveraged this program year for the current phases of construction. The current phases under improvements on Locust Ave. from Bryan Ave. to Highlawn Ave. During the program year \$933,709 in CDBG funds were expensed on the next phase.

Construction was completed on improvements at Kirklevington Park. Improvements were made to the lighting at the pickleball courts and the courts were resurfaced. Construction was started on improvements with the addition of a shade structure at the Isaac Murphy Park. Construction is expected to be completed by Dec. 2024. A \$150,000 Application Fee Assistance Program Memorandum of Understanding was executed with LFUCG's Community and Resident Services to assist in lowering the barriers to accessing safe and affordable housing by providing Fayette County renters with financial assistance to pay rental application fees.

A \$3,000,000 Economic Development Initiative/Community Project Funding was previously awarded for the William Wells Brown Project. The project will result in the land acquisition and construction of a new Prep Academy. Once completed the 5 classrooms will serve between 60 to 100 children each year.

### **Narrative**

For the HOME TBRA project, 50% of the households assisted are minority households. Over 77% of the households assisted with the local government's owner-occupied rehabilitation and the emergency repair program were minority households.

Affirmative marketing of the programs is stressed. For the CHDO HOME rental projects 80% of the unserved applicants were minorities. Of the 3 households assisted with the homebuyer programs this reporting period 66% were minorities. Over 90% of the applicants for the R.E.A.C.H., Inc. first-time homebuyer's program have been minority applicants. R.E.A.C.H., Inc. employs a bilingual employee that works with Hispanic clients. R.E.A.C.H., Inc. makes program information available to members of the local Hispanic community through group workshops and individual sessions.

The Division of Grants and Special Program's homeowner rehabilitation team attended the Housing Workshop for Homeowners and Renters at the Kenwick Community Center in March 2024 and the West End Community Resource Fair in June 2024 to promote the housing rehab and emergency repairs programs. Both of these events were targeted toward low income homeowners in predominatly minority neighborhoods.

CDBG funds were expensed for outreach services for 255 young adults who are homeless or at risk of being homeless, 60% of those assisted were minorities.

CDBG funds were expensed for public service projects and included the following: the Police Acitivties League provided mentoring and sports and educational opportunities to 102 youth participants with 94% minority; Moveable Feast provided meals to HIV and hospice patients for 175 persons with 39% minority persons being assisted; Repairers Lexington provided 35 youth with academic enrichment opportunities, 100% were minority participants; Explorium of Lexington provided educational activities for 164 youth, 82% minority.

CDBG funds were expensed for case management and outreach to the Foundation for Affordable Housing where 367 persons were assisted, 54% being minority.

The three rental projects completed this program year housed 16 households, 33% were minority households.

The local government committed and expended \$360,000 in non-federal funds and \$300,000 in the U.S. Treasury's State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds to assist 679 households with emergency financial assistance for rent, mortgage payments, and utilities during the program year. The local government also expensed \$4,024,918 in Affordable Housing Trust Funds.

### **Narrative**

The bulk of the local government's CDBG funding has been spent for public improvements in the Meadows/Northland/Arlington area located in Census Tracts 14 and 15. Historically this low-income neighborhood has had drainage problems. Work began on this project in 1998 and is being completed in phases due to the overall cost of the improvements.

A \$1,242,903 construction contract for public improvements on Highlawn Ave. from Bluegrass Avenue

to end of street, Gutherie Alley from first turn to Highlawn Ave., and Bolser Avenue from Highlawn Avenue to Gracelawn Avenue was executed in July 2021. In April 2022, the next phase of the project was added to the contract which includes public improvements on Bluegrass Ave. from Bryan Ave. to Highlawn Ave. During the program year \$385,735 in CDBG funds were expensed on construction of these phases; which includes replacement of curbs, gutters, sidewalks, street reconstruction, and storm sewer improvements. These phases were completed in December 2023.

The local government's owner-occupied rehabilitation and owner-occupied housing emergency repair programs that alleviate substandard conditions to improve housing quality for low-income households is community wide. Five households were assisted with the rehabilitation program to make improvements in their homes and thirty households were assisted with the emergency repair program.

The first-time homebuyer program assists eligible households to purchase homes community wide. This program year 3 households were assisted to become first-time homebuyers.

CDBG funds were spent to maintain fair housing compliance. During the program year 23 housing complaints were conducted and resolved with 8 settlements.

The contracts for all of the public service projects have been awarded and include the following: Police Activities League, \$25,000; New Beginnings, Bluegrass, Inc., \$54,000, operation of a housing navigation supportive services program for low-income persons with serious mental illnesses who are transitioning to permanent housing; Radio Eye, Inc., \$30,000, a program that provides access to information for persons with disabilities; Moveable Feast of Lexington, Inc., \$30,000, for services to provide meals and medicines to individuals affected by HIV/AIDS and hospice care patients; Repairers of the Breach, Inc., \$20,000, for the operation of an educational after-school program for youth; and Arbor Youth Services, Inc., \$50,000, operation of an outreach center to support youth who are homeless or at risk of homelessness.

Funds for services are not based upon geographic locations, but based upon income eligibility of population being served.

### Leveraging

Explain how federal funds leveraged additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements were satisfied, as well as how any publicly owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that were used to address the needs identified in the plan.

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government provided local dollars in the amount of \$225,804 as match for the HOME Program during the reporting period. The matching requirements for the Emergency Solutions Grant Program were met with local dollars of \$64,102 and \$135,937 from the operating budgets of the sub-recipients. In addition, the local government committed and expended \$360,000 in non-federal funds to assist 447 households with emergency financial assistance for mortgage payment, rent, and utilities during the program year. The government expended \$300,000 in U.S. Treasury ARPA funds to assist 232 households with emergency financial assistance. The local government expensed \$4,024,918 in Affordable Housing Trust Funds.

Main Street Baptist Church Manor leveraged \$500,000 in HOME funds with \$1,757,350 in U.S. Treasury ARPA funds from the local government's Office of Affordable Housing.

Polo Club Park Apartments, LLLP. leveraged \$453,409 in HOME funds with \$3,294,391 in Low-Income Housing Tax Credit equity and \$676,591 from the local government's Office of Affordable Housing to construct 24 new rental units for low-income senior households. This project also received a \$50,000 donation from Clay Ingles, Co. LLC.

The publicly owned property that was used to address the needs identified in the plan was park land for use as public facilities.

### Discuss the difference between goals and outcomes and problems encountered in meeting these goals.

Rising housing prices made it hard to find affordable housing units to purchase. Although existing units were not purchased, new housing units were built and 3 households were assisted with our first-time homebuyers activity.

The goal for production of new rental units constructed was met as 4 units were anticipated and completed. It was anticipated that 25 units would be assisted with housing rehabilitation and 17 units

would be assisted with emergency repairs, but only 5 units were assisted with rehabilitation and 30 units were assisted with emergency repairs. Eleven rental units were rehabilitated for low income households. Four households were assisted with Tenant Based rental assistance.

### Discuss how these outcomes will impact future annual action plans.

The local government will continue to offer the owner-occupied rehabiliation program that alleviates substandard conditions to improve housing quality for low-income households and the owner-occupied housing emergency repair program which provides deferred loans up to \$8,500 to assist eligible low-income homeowners for emergency repairs for electrical, plumbing, heating, and air conditioning systems. The local government will continue to offer Tenant Based Rental Assistance and HOME as gap financing for large rental projects.

### **Narrative Information**

The households above were assisted through first-time homebuyer programs, rental projects, tenant-based rental assistance, housing assistance programs for individuals with serious mental illness transitioning to permanent housing from institutional settings, the local government's sidewalk repair, owner occupied rehabilitation, and emergency repair programs.

New Beginnings Bluegrass, Inc. was awarded CDBG funds for provision of a housing navigator to provide services to individuals with serious mental illnesses transitioning from institutional living situations to permanent housing. CDBG funds were spent during the program year to assist 30 people, 16 of whom were homeless. Out of those 30 people, 4 were able to obtain permanent housing and 11 were assisted with prevention to maintain housing.

AIDS Volunteers Inc. was previously awarded \$33,500 and spent \$20,936 in HOME funds to operate a tenant-based rental assistance program for low-income households that have at least one HIV positive family member. AIDS Volunteers, Inc. has assisted 4 households with extremely low-income to move into decent and affordable rental housing.

CR-25 - Homeless and Other Special Needs 91.220(d, e); 91.320(d, e); 91.520(c) Evaluate the jurisdiction's progress in meeting its specific objectives for reducing and ending homelessness through:

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

In 2024, Lexington completed both a sheltered and unsheltered count on the evening of the LexCount, the CoC's annual Point-in-Time Count. This year, 825 persons were found to be experiencing homelessness. This includes 706 persons residing in emergency shelter, 37 persons residing in transitional housing, and 82 persons found to be unsheltered. Lexington saw only a minor increase in overall homelessness, with an increase of 1.2% over 2023.

The CoC saw a decrease in single adults experiencing homelessness, falling 7% from the previous year. Minor decreases were also seen among those experiencing chronic homelessness and veterans. The largest increase was among unsheltered persons, rising from 38 persons in 2023 to 82 persons in 2024. This is consistent with reduced utilization rates seen for emergency shelter and transitional housing beds. Despite an increase of 6% in seasonal shelter beds available compared to 2023, the number of persons in emergency shelter decreased approximately 2%. As such, the CoC is focusing upon strategies to quickly move persons to permanent housing.

During the program year, the local government expensed \$1,380,142 through the Office of Homelessness Prevention and Intervention (OHPI) to prevent and ended homelessness.

Hope Center completed an initial year of a three-year term to deliver street outreach services to persons experiencing unsheltered homelessness; their program includes peer support specialists and peer mentors, a housing navigator, a SOAR specialist, and a clinician. This project is funded at \$300,000 annually.

The OHPI completed previously funded projects including a representative payee program and development of a learning management system to provide training for frontline service staff. The payee program has been transitioned to Community and Resident Services, a division within the City.

Development of the onboarding curriculum was completed in HUD FY24 and launching in summer 2024.

The OHPI also provided one-time funding to New Life Day Center of \$75,554 for improvements to include: a shade structure, portable toilets and handwashing stations, and a water bottle filling station. Newly launched programs include an intensive-case management program operated by Independence Place providing housing-focused supports to individuals with disabilities (\$98,065) and a program operated by the Lexington Housing Authority to engage and recruit landlords for participation in rental assistance programs (\$300,000).

The OHPI also increased annual investments in emergency shelter to \$1,918,014. Shelter funding was received by GreenHouse17 (survivors of domestic violence), Community Action (families), Arbor Youth Services (0-17, 18-24), Bluegrass Care Navigators (medical respite), the Hope Center (men), the Salvation Army (women/families), and New Life Day Center.

In addition to annual funding for shelter, the local government expensed \$1,742,700 in temporary winter shelter resources. This included a large temporary shelter serving adult men and women as well as short-term hotel stays for families with minor children, the elderly, and individuals with disabilities.

All investments reflect priorities of the OHPI's five-year strategic, released in January 2021.

The Housing Stabilization Program, funded via the U.S. Treasury, continued to provide emergency assistance with rent and utilities to households impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. During the program year, 899 households were served with \$4,686,817 in rental ssistance. In anticipation of funding for direct assistance being exhausted, the program awarded \$1.1 million to two non-profit partners - Legal Aid of the Bluegrass and Kentucky Equal Justice Center to provide housing stability services.

### Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

GreenHouse17 was awarded \$50,000 in Emergency Solutions Grant Funds to assist in the costs of operation of the shelter for homeless victims of domestic violence. During the program year 226 persons, including 93 children, were provided with safe emergency shelter and supportive services. Of the persons assisted, 107 were able to move into permanent housing.

Arbor Youth Services was awarded \$73,071 and spent \$40,153 in Emergency Solutions Grant Funds to assist in the costs of operation of an emergency shelter for youth. During the program year 70 youth were provided with safe emergency shelter and supportive services. Of the youth assisted, 55 were able to move into permanent housing.

Community Action Council was previously awarded Emergency Solutions Cares Act Grant Funds to assist in the costs of case management at an emergency shelter during the pandemic. This program year 127 homeless persons were provided with emergency shelter services and 8 were able to move into permanent housing.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

New Beginnings Bluegrass, Inc. was awarded \$54,000 in CDBG funds for operating a housing navigation

supportive services program for individuals with serious mental illnesses transitioning to permanent housing from institutional settings. \$40,800 in CDBG funds was spent during the program year to assist 30 people. Of those 30 people 4 were able to obtain permanent housing and 11 were assisted with maintaining permanent housing.

Arbor Youth Services was awarded \$50,000 in CDBG funds for the operation of a street outreach center to engage young adults, ages 18-24, that are homeless or at risk of homelessness. The program expensed \$64251 to assist 274 young adults.

Foundation for Affordable Housing was awarded \$60,772 in CDBG for providing case management to 102 residents of the St. James Place Apartments. The case manager also worked in conjunction with the Central Christian Community Outreach. 367 persons were provided case management and 13 homeless persons were able to obtain permanent housing.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

Arbor Youth Services was awarded \$73,908 and expensed \$90,438 in Emergency Solutions Grant funds to employ youth advocates to conduct case management services for young adults, ages 18-24, who are homeless or at risk of homelessness. During the program year 32 homeless persons were assisted with rapid re-housing services.

New Beginnings Bluegrass, Inc. was previously awarded \$349,331 and expensed \$83,787 this program year in Emergency Solutions Cares Act Grant Funds to provide case management and rapid rehousing services during the pandemic for adults with serious mental illness who are homeless or at risk of homelessness.

Explorium of Lexington was previously awarded \$25,594 in CDBG funds to work with GreenHouse 17, Salvation Army, and Arbor Youth Services to provide STEM/STEAM educational activities for youth in shelters. The program expensed over \$11,680 to serve 164 youth, 149 youth increased their knowledge of science, technology, and mathematics.

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Housing Authority remains committed to working with local government and community groups to address the needs of families in need of permanent housing. The Housing Authority offers rental assistance to the homeless population through its Housing Choice Voucher special partner vouchers. The Housing Authority receives an annual grant to provide

permanent housing for 30 participants that are disabled and homeless. The Housing Authority coordinates with the government's Office of Homelessness Prevention and Intervention for referrals from the Continuum of Care's Coordinated Entry List.

The Housing Authority currently provides 324 Veterans Affairs Supportive Vouchers and 32 Project Based Housing Choice Vouchers for the Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing Program for rental assistance for homeless veterans. Homeless veterans are referred to the public housing agencies for these vouchers based upon a variety of factors, most importantly the need for and the willingness to participate in case management and clinical services provided by the Department of Veterans Affairs at its medical centers and in the community. The policies of the Housing Choice Voucher program have been revised so that veterans with dishonorable discharges can now be accepted into the program. An additional 75 vouchers are provided for families that include an adult household member who is a veteran. In addition to veterans receiving a preference on the Housing Choice Voucher and public housing waiting list, the Housing Authority employs a housing navigator to assist veterans in securing permanent housing.

### CR-30 - Public Housing 91.220(h); 91.320(j)

### Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Housing Authority is currently working towards building more affordable housing units to address the needs of public housing.

The city of Lexington's first HOME Investment Partnerships American Rescue Plan Program (HOME-ARP) development held a ribbon cutting in May 2024. The Lexington Housing Authority's Pemberton Development project's agreement was executed on June 30, 2023 and included \$900,000 of HOME-ARP funds and \$516,452 of Lexington Affordable Housing funds. The Housing Authority provided 5 Housing Choice Vouchers and provided permanent housing for the qualified tenants. Supportive services and homeless prevention services will be provided to the tenants by the Housing Authority. Each two bedroom townhouse will be 1,200 square foot and have washer and dryer hookups. All units are leased and all households are eligible for case management.

The Lexington Housing Authority completed a new 6 townhouse complex located on Race and Third Streets. The six townhouses range in size from 1302-1348 square feet.

The Housing Authority had plans to development 59 units of affordable housing at 1604 Versailles Road. The property was purchased in September of 2021 and will be divided into two blocks. The north block will be from Versailles Road to Hill Rise Drive and the south block will be from Hill Rise Drive to Hill Rise Place. This project is stalled due to neighborhood opposition.

The Housing Authority is in the planning stages to develop a final parcel of land that was left undeveloped previously on Shropshire Avenue. The proposed development will include 9 single family homes and an early childhood prep academy. Through an awarded HUD Economic Development Initiative/Community Funding Project, Community Action Council will purchase land and will constuct the Prep Academy at Palmer Complex. The complex will have 5 classrooms.

### Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The Housing Authority offers outreach services to families who need assistance in accessing resources such as continuing education, child care, employment, etc. The Resident Services Coordinator provides outreach to households at public housing family sites to assess their needs and coordinate available resources in the community to meet those needs. In addition, two Family Self-Sufficiency Coordinators and one Resident Opportunities Self-Sufficiency Coordinator offer case management to qualifying Housing Choice Voucher and public housing households. The coordinators work with the families to develop a self-sufficiency plan.

The primary purpose of self-sufficiency case management is to promote the development of local

strategies to coordinate affordable housing assistance with public and private resources for supportive services and resident empowerment activities. These services enable participating families to increase earned income, reduce or eliminate the need for welfare assistance, make progress toward achieving economic independence and housing self-sufficiency. Currently 100 households are participating in the program.

The Housing Choice Voucher Homeownership Program is designed to provide homeownership opportunities for low-income families. The program administered by REACH, Inc. requires participants to be both income and mortgage eligible. Currently the Housing Authority is assisting 24 families with their mortgage payments through this program.

### Actions taken to provide assistance to troubled PHAs

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Housing Authority is not designated as troubled by HUD, and has been deemed a high performer since 2011.

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Housing Authority participates in HUD's Moving to Work Program. This program allows agencies to locally design housing and self-sufficiency strategies to strengthen the delivery of services to households living in public housing to enhance federal rental assistance. The program allows exemptions from existing public housing rules and permits housing agencies to combine operating, capital, and tenant-based assistance funds into a single funding source. The increased subsidy has assisted the housing authority to better service the debt that will be incurred from the required renovation and rehabilitation work completed on the rental housing units. In April 2016 HUD extended the agreement with the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Housing Authority for the program through 2028. As of July 1, 2023 the total number of Moving to Work Program housing choice vouchers is 2,675.

### CR-35 - Other Actions 91.220(j)-(k); 91.320(i)-(j)

Actions taken to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. 91.220 (j); 91.320 (i)

During the program year the director of the local government's Office of Affordable Housing continued his work in conjunction with an advisory board to study housing market conditions, propose affordable housing programs, and work with partner agencies to evaluate program effectiveness.

The Urban County Council has de-regulated the Zoning Ordinance to allow for workforce and affordable housing development in nearly all residential zones as a density bonus, eliminating the need for contentious NIMBY public hearings, a change that was embraced by the affordable housing providers.

In addition, the Council further modernized selected articles of the Zoning Ordinance to:

- Expand the housing types permitted, including missing middle and cottage housing
- Reduce minimum lot sizes, establish maximum lot sizes, and reduce setbacks to enable efficiency in the use of scarce and expensive land
- Increase building heights in the medium and high density zones
- Require variety in housing types to address missing middle housing
- Remove barriers that inhibited development of neighborhood-serving businesses.

During this time, the Planning Commission began preparing a master plan for 2,800 acres of new urban land, as directed by Council. The master plan, along with the updates to the Zoning Ordinance, will provide opportunities for housing for low-income households and jobs for all levels of employment.

Funded with American Rescue Plan Act funds along with the city's funds the Division of Code Enforcement is operating a Housing Repair Assistance Program to assist low-income homeowner's with code violations to make needed repairs. Code Enforcement works with the homeowner to bring the unit into compliance. Thirty-seven households were assisted with the program this year.

During the program year, the Division of Code Enforcement became accredited by the International Accreditation Service. It was the first code enforcement department in the state to become accreditated and the sixth in the nation.

### Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

Projects were identified which address the underserved needs, including the first-time homebuyer programs which provided subsidies up to \$30,000 for low-moderate income households to obtain homeownership; tenant based rental assistance program with 1 non-profit; gap financing for the

development of rental housing projects serving low-income households, elderly households and the special needs population; and the owner-occupied rehabilitation program to assist homeowners to alleviate substandard housing.

### Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The government has trained, and continues to train staff and contractors on the lead-based paint regulations and its effect on the CDBG and HOME Housing Rehabilitation Program.

As required by the regulations, risk assessments, lead testing, evaluation, control and abatement became an even more integral part of the housing rehabilitation program and all other housing programs. Compliance with the regulations continue to reduce the number of housing rehabilitation units completed. As rehabilitation costs continue to rise, more units meet the abatement threshold and require more dollars and time to complete.

During the reporting period there were two risk assessments completed for the housing rehabilitation program, with both housing units having lead hazards.

There was one instance of temporary relocation for lead abatement during the rehabilitation of housing units. Communication with the contractor as to availability of materials and the homeowner as to the most accommodating time for the vacancy were taken into account to minimize the amount of relocation necessary.

### Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The local government's Division of Procurement employs a Minority Program Coordinator to facilitate the participation of minority and women owned businesses in the procurement process. The Division of Purchasing has an online Section 3 business certification system to register qualified businesses. The system allows the government to capture eligible Section 3 businesses through the HUD Section 3 link to provide a list of contractors, if new hires or Section 3 businesses are needed. The list is updated monthly by the Division of Purchasing.

The predominant anti-poverty agency for the county is Community Action Council. The government targets the operation of programs and services to persons identified by the Council as over represented in the poverty ranks.

High school dropouts are one of the groups over represented in the poverty ranks. The contracts for public services activities include 2 educational programs for low-income youth. In response to the community's request for a year-round work program for youth, the city held other youth events. Skills Session classes were held weekly from January to April 2024 with topics including: Financial Literacy hosted by Chase Bank, Soft Skills, On-the-Job Etiquette Training hosted by the Urban League and the City of Lexington, and Navigation of the city's Bus System hosted by Lextran; 400 youth successfully

completed the sessions.

A Career Fair was held on March 16, 2024 for youth to learn about the different worksites that were participating in the summer work program. Four time slots were available for 100 youth per time slot, for a total of 400 slots. The fair was attended by 400 youth.

The City of Lexington's Summer Youth Employment Program was funded this year with the U.S. Treasury's State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund and ran six weeks from June 10 through July 19, 2024. The program is for rising 10th, 11th, and 12th grade students with priority being based on social, economic, and educational factors. Youth were given the opportunity to gain work experience, develop interpersonal skills, learn and explore career interests, all while earning income during the summer. There were 300 youth workers who worked part-time, up to 20 hours per week, and earned \$15 per hour. The city paid all youth workers' salaries. Over 120 private and public businesses signed up to be worksites to offer these opportunities for youth.

The College for Technical Education, a non-profit corporation continues its efforts to train those persons who are in most need and hard to serve whose income is at or below the poverty level. The training involves an integration of skills training, basic skills instruction and human development. The training is open-entry, open-exit, with competency based, highly individualized, hands-on training. With secondary support being provided including child development and child care centers, adult education (GED), transitional housing and networking. The program offers nine curriculums: Cosmetology, Lash Artistry Certification, Apprentice Instructor, Nail Technician, Esthetics, Medical Massage Therapy, Medical Assistant, Business Operations, and Building Trades Technician. Most of the curriculums may be achieved in nine to twelve months.

### Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

In 2018 the local government created a Task Force on Neighborhoods in Transition to discuss the topics of infill and development, preservation and gentrification. The group comprised of Councilmembers, city developers, planners, historians, residents, and other community members identified ways to protect vulnerable residents from the impact of neighborhood redevelopment and transformation especially displacement. Per the recommendations of the June 2021 final report to improve structure and assistance, the local government restructured the housing services divisions to build strong and equitable neighborhoods and provide needed guidance to the public. The Department of Housing Advocacy and Community Development includes the Grants and Special Programs, Code Enforcement, and Community and Resident Services. The division of Historic Preservation was moved to the Department of Planning and Preservation to better align with the structure of the government. The division of Grants and Special Programs is responsible for the financial management of all federal, state, and foundation grants to the city. The division has lead responsibility for development of the Consolidated Plan and for implementation and monitoring of CDBG, HOME, and ESG programs. In addition, the division is responsible for operating a housing rehabilitation program and an emergency housing repair program for low-income households. The Affordable Housing

Manager conducts activities under the local Affordable Housing Trust Fund. The Office of Homelessness Prevention and Intervention has been moved to the Department of Housing Advocacy and Community Development. The Division of Engineering is responsible for planning, bidding, and constructing public improvements. This division reports to the Commissioner of the Department of Environmental Quality and Public Works.

### Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

During the program year the manager of the local government's Office of Affordable Housing continued his work in conjunction with an advisory board to study housing market conditions, propose affordable housing programs, and work with partner agencies to evaluate program effectiveness. The mission of the Affordable Housing Fund is to leverage public investment to preserve, produce, and provide safe, quality, affordable housing. The funding commitments allocated for the program year are:

- Davis Park Apartments, 73 units, \$4,200,000;
- Briarwood Apartments, 204 units, \$500,000, Rehab;
- Wellington Place Apartments, 45 units, \$1,700,000;
- The Flats at Woodland, 38 units, \$4,200,000;
- Snow Road, 4 units, \$250,000;
- Expo Court, 4 units, \$200,000;
- Ashland Terrace, 3 units, \$145,000.

The units completed during the program year were 24 units for New Beginnings, 5 units for the Lexington Housing Authority, 16 units for Maywick View, 29 units at Georgetown Street, 252 units at Kearney Ridge, and 202 units Christian Towers. The 24 units completed for New Beginnings will all receive supportive services, 8 of those units are HOME ARP funded and must be occupied by qualified populations to address housing instability and homelessness.

### Identify actions taken to overcome the effects of any impediments identified in the jurisdictions analysis of impediments to fair housing choice. 91.520(a)

The most recent analysis completed listed lack of accessible/special needs housing as an impediment to fair housing choice.

Through the Office of Affordable Housing, Christian Towers was assisted to construct 40 new and rehabilitate 92 rental units for elderly and mobility impaired low-income households.

New Beginnings, Bluegrass, Inc. was awarded \$1,185,822 in HOME ARP funds and \$880,000 in the city's Affordable Housing funds to acquire and rehabilitate 24 rental units. The HOME ARP funded eight rental units must be occupied by qualified populations to address housing instability and homelessness. These units will also be provided supportive services.

To gain a better understanding of the community's housing needs the Office of Affordable Housing conducted a needs analysis this program year. The city has dedicated \$38.5 million through the Affordable Housing Fund to create or preserve 3,171 units. The mission of the Affordable Housing Fund is to leverage public investment to preserve, produce, and provide safe, quality, affordable housing. The final report will be completed in the fall of 2024.

Despite these efforts, challenges persist, exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic's impact on the rental market. The needs analysis project serves as a way to reassess Lexington's housing needs and explore potential solutions.

Describe the standards and procedures used to monitor activities carried out in furtherance of the plan and used to ensure long-term compliance with requirements of the programs involved, including minority business outreach and the comprehensive planning requirements

During the reporting period the grantee complied with all requested certifications for specific programs as required by the regulations. In addition, all entitlement funds available to grantee were pursued and obtained and expended as the Action Plan identified and supported all applications by other entities as identified in the Plan.

The government completes a monitoring risk analysis worksheet for projects. An analysis is completed for all projects annually that had unexpended funds as of the end of the program year. The analysis looks at the amount of grant funds, total unexpended grant funds, program income, and previous monitoring reviews for the project. During the reporting period five on-site monitoring visits were completed. All findings and concerns were addressed. The government continues to receive and review the annual audits of sub-recipients to identify potential problems.

The local government employs a Minority Business Liaison to facilitate the participation of minority and women owned businesses in the procurement process. The government uses a vendors list for Minority and Women Business Enterprise for outreach purposes and has an Affirmative Action Plan that requires all bidders, contractors, or subcontractors to comply with minimum goals for minority/female business utilization. The local government recently completed a disparity study to ensure minority businesses are given fair access to the procurement process. The study caused the government to revise the resolution which changes the goal to 5% for minority-owned businesses and 12% for women-owned businesses and expands the goals to cover all purchases. The Three Percent Goal Plan is in place to increase the participation of Veterans and Service-Disabled Veterans in the city's procurement process, as the goal is to have a minimum of three percent of the businesses the city procures from be veteran owned. Race and gender neutral measures that are still in progress include small contract opportunities, unbundling large contracts, supportive services, comprehensive date collection, monitoring, and creating a Small Local Business Enterprise Program.

In February 2024 the annual Construction Business Connection Event was held at the Picadome outing room at the Gay Brewer Jr. Golf Course in Lexington. It's an annual event where prime contractors and minority, women, and veteran subcontractors come together to learn about the city's purchasing process.

During the reporting period 11% of the contractors participating in the housing rehabilitation program

are minority owned businesses.

The public notice of the Consolidated Annual Performance Report draft was published in the Lexington-Herald Leader on September 11, 2024. A notice was published on the local government's website and sent to neighborhood associations and churches in low-income neighborhoods and to organizations and individuals who have indicated an interest in the housing and community development needs of the low-income and special needs populations, letting them know that the draft of the annual report was available for review and comments would be accepted until September 26, 2024 as the submission of the report would be completed on September 27, 2024. The government's website offers translation in Spanish or French for non-English speaking persons. The notice also offered assistance to persons with disabilities or non-English speaking persons in obtaining a copy of the draft, if requested the government intended to have the information translated. In addition to a copy of the draft on the government's website, the draft of the report was also placed for public review on the website of the Lexington Public Library.

### Provide an assessment of the jurisdiction's affirmative marketing actions for HOME units. 24 CFR 91.520(e) and 24 CFR 92.351(a)

Affirmative marketing of HOME funded projects is stressed in all printed material and in all discussions with owners of potential HOME projects. R.E.A.C.H., Inc. and Lexington Habitat for Humanity market their first-time homebuyer program through community meetings and written brochures.

Other activities for R.E.A.C.H., Inc. included continuing to work with the local Housing Authority on the Section 8 Homeownership and the Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing programs; partnered with Global Lex and Kentucky Housing Corporation to provide classes to Limited English Proficient low to moderate income families in the community; and partnered with Kentucky Refugee Ministries to provide education at their cultural orientations program.

R.E.A.C.H., Inc. employs a bilingual homebuyer education coordinator to work with Hispanic clients. The coordinator makes program information available to members of the local Hispanic community through group workshops and individual sessions.

Over 95% of the applicants for the R.E.A.C.H., Inc. first-time homebuyer's program have been minority applicants and 85% have a female head of household. The total average household income for all HOME program applicants to R.E.A.C.H., Inc. was \$60,388.19.

Lexington Habitat for Humanity promoted their Homebuyer Program at a housing fair at the Lexington Senior Center; the Clean Slate Lexington Expungement Clinic held at the Central Bank Center; and the Career and Community Resource Fair at the Bluegrass Community Technical College.

Of our rental projects completed, Parkside II Apartments, Ferrill Square Apartments, Virginia Place I Apartments and Russell School Apartments; all are successful in marketing their units to minorities. Parkside II Apartments has 78% of the units occupied by minority families; Ferrill Square Apartments has 80% of the units occupied by minority families; Virginia Place I Apartments has 60% of the units occupied by minority families; and the Russell School Apartments has 89% of the units occupied by minority families.

The two rental projects completed this program year housed 15 households, 33% were minority

households. For the HOME TBRA project, 50% of the households assisted are minority households.

Minorities and women owned businesses have been given full opportunity to participate in the HOME Investment Partnership program. During the reporting period 11% of the contractors participating in the housing rehabilitation program are minority owned businesses.

The total amount of HOME program income received and expensed this program year was \$81,281.79. The total amount of HOME program income was expended this period for housing rehabilitation of owner-occupied units and the first-time homebuyer's program.

A total of \$39,126.08 of program income was expended for the housing rehabilitation program. A total of 8 units were awarded and 3 units were completed during this reporting period. Additionally, 2 units were completed this period that were awarded last reporting period. Of the 5 households assisted, 2 had extremely low-income, 2 had low-income and 1 had moderate income. Four of the households were minority families.

Over \$42,155.71 of program income was expended to assist three single-parent low-income families to become first-time homebuyers. Of the 3 low-income households, 2 are minority families.

### Describe other actions taken to foster and maintain affordable housing. 24 CFR 91.220(k) (STATES ONLY: Including the coordination of LIHTC with the development of affordable housing). 24 CFR 91.320(j)

In the five year Consolidated Plan, the local government determined that the highest priority for assistance would be to increase the supply and opportunities for affordable housing for extremely low, low and moderate income households. The availability and accessibility of other federal, state, and local government funds and the availability of private sources of funds were considered in addition to federal regulations limiting the use of HOME funds. The amount expended by the local government for HOME administration was \$37,852.65.

The Fayette County Local Development Corp., one of the government's designated CHDO's, was awarded \$20,000 and spent \$23,540 in HOME funds for administration.

R.E.A.C.H., Inc., one of the government's designated CHDO's, was awarded \$20,000 and spent \$22,189 in HOME funds for administration. R.E.A.C.H., was awarded \$420,000 in HOME funds to purchase rehabilitate, and pre-sell 2 housing units to low-income homebuyers. The constraints of the area housing market combined with an increase in cost have resulted in delays to the project.

A total of \$55,000 in HOME funds and HOME program income were committed and expended by

Lexington Habitat for Humanity a non-profit organization whose purpose is to make housing more affordable to first-time homebuyers. Three loans were closed this reporting period.

Kentucky Housing Corporation issued 11 Mortgage Credit Certificates to first-time homeowners in Fayette County during the program year. Of the 11 households, the average annual income was \$69,965. The average loan amount was \$200,057, with the average purchase price at \$220,936.

AIDS Volunteers Inc. was previously awarded \$33,500 and spent \$20,936 in HOME funds to operate a tenant-based rental assistance program for low-income households that have at least one HIV positive family member. AIDS Volunteers, Inc. has assisted 4 households with extremely low-income to move into decent and affordable rental housing.

AU Associates, Inc. was previously awarded \$453,409 in HOME and \$676,591 in Affordable Housing Trust funds for the Polo Club Park Apartments, a new construction project containing 24 units. The project expensed \$57,599 this program year. The project will serve seniors 55 plus serving residents below 60% of the AMI. Four unites were HOME assisted. The Project was completed this program year.

Main Street Baptist Church Manor, Inc. was previously awarded \$500,000 in HOME funds and \$1,757,350 of ARPA Affordable Housing Funds for the rehabilitation of 64 units of housing for elderly, low-income households. HOME funds assisted 11 units in the project. The project was completed this program year.

New Beginnings Blue Grass was awarded \$1,185,822 in HOME-ARP and \$880,000 from the city's Affordable Housing Funds to acquire and rehabilitate 24 rental units. 8 units were HOME-ARP assisted. The HOME ARP funded eight rental units must be occupied by qualified populations to address housing instability and homelessness. These units will also be provided supportive services.

The Lexington Housing Authority's Pemberton Development was awarded \$900,000 of HOME-ARP funds and \$516,452 of ARPA Affordable Housing funds for the new construction of 5 two-bedroom townhouses. The Housing Authority provided 5 Housing Choice Vouchers and provided permanent housing for the tenants. These units will be provided supportive services.

AU Associates, Inc. was previously awarded \$812,575 in HOME funds and \$4,825,000 from the Lexington ARPA Affordable Housing funds for the Richwood Bend Apartments, a new construction project containing 83 units. 4 of the units are HOME funded. The project will serve families under 60% AMI.

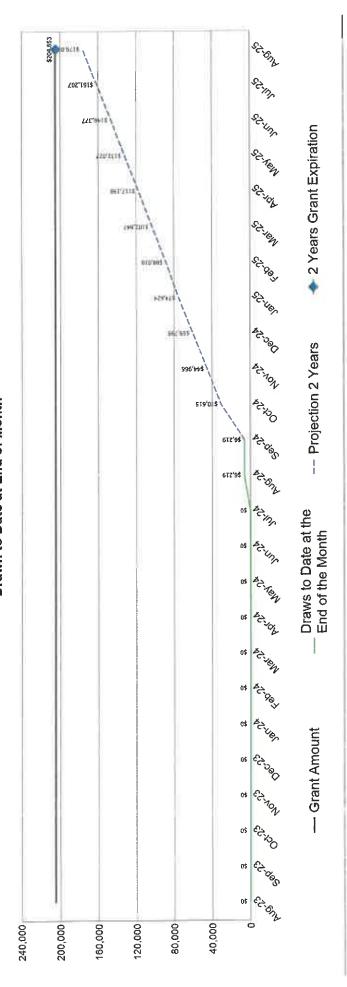
