<u>Updating City's Strategic Plan</u>

PLEASE SAVE THE DATE of February 4th, 2025 as ONE Lexington will be looking to update its citywide strategic plan to address youth & young adult gun violence. In the first quarter of 2022, in partnership with Cities United & the University of Kentucky Community Innovation Lab, ONE Lexington brought over 40 community partners together to build our city's plan. While Cure Violence and CVI were solid templates and guides for our city, we felt a more intentional and Lexington-centered plan would be more impactful. Since that plan has been enacted we've seen nearly a 60 percent decrease in homicides and a 50 percent decrease in nonfatal shootings. The majority of this progress can be attributed to community partnerships.



But now it's time to get back into the war room and fine-tune that plan TOGETHER. See what is working, what isn't working, what adjustments need to be made, what policies can be implemented, and what new trends we are seeing. We also want to make sure we are addressing the root causes of gun violence such as trauma, mental health, systemic barriers, racial disparities, education, affordable housing, economic opportunity, and more.





<u>Updating City's Strategic Plan</u>

We cannot do this without you. We will be inviting **survivors**, **former drivers of violence**, **public safety**, **the school system**, **courts**, **nonprofits**, **faith**, **youth**, **neighborhood associations**, **government agencies**, **and more to be a part of this discussion**. We prided the original strategic plan so much because it wasn't the mayor's plan or ONE Lexington's plan, but the city's plan. We will be coupling our 1-day strategic planning session in 2025, with multiple community forums across the city during February and March so we can also make sure the voices of the people are informing this plan.

More details will come, but please prepare to take a half day on February 4th. We can provide letters directly from the mayor's office to employers for anyone who may need to take time off work to be there. Please start making those arrangements now, and keep us posted on what you need!

Supporting Gun Violence Survivors In Lexington:

Since July 1st, the beginning of the fiscal year, ONE Lexington has spent over \$60,000 of its fiscal budget on "survivor support", and this follows another \$100,000 plus in support for survivors in our previous fiscal year. That support includes relocation services, utility and rent support, property damage caused by gunfire, moving expenses, and more. ONE Lexington, in partnership with Governor Beshear's "Everybody Counts" initiative, has committed another \$180,000 towards mental health and trauma support for families who have been affected by gun violence since 2020. Every vetted violence prevention model out there talks about the importance of survivor support. It helps mitigate retaliatory violence, address untreated trauma, and incorporate the lived experiences of those affected by gun violence into a city's strategic plan. Kenneth Payne leads our Crisis Response efforts and Larry Johnson focuses on community outreach, and together they have done a great job in supporting our survivors. I've seen them help movers load up a U-Haul, track down college transcripts and diplomas of young people we've lost to gun violence, and be conduits between public safety and survivors looking for more information on their loved one's case. But, we can do better! We look forward to the update of our city's strategic plan on February 4th, 2025, so we can learn directly from survivors on how we can better serve them and incorporate them into our strategy.

ONE Lexington Featured at Cities United's 11th Annual Convening:

Last week the One Lexington team attended the 11th annual Cities United Convening, themed "Public Safety Redefined: Shifting the Narrative". What does that look like for the city of Lexington? A strong and supportive political will, young leaders fully integrated, a government office focused on supporting and advocating community safety efforts, a clear and robust asset-framed messaging and communications strategy, an enhanced CVI ecosystem concentrated on individuals and communities most impacted, and cross-sector collaboration and accountability infrastructure. Leaders at the conference also lamented the importance of having survivor voices and credible messengers playing a central role in developing your strategy, which we hope to continue here at home. We also had the honor of sitting on a panel in front of 1,000 + mayors, doctors, educators, survivors, outreach workers, interrupters, and other violence prevention professionals from across the country at the 11th Annual Cities United Convening to speak about the amazing work being done in our city over the last 3 years. One Lexington also held a breakout session focused on developing a crisis response strategy. Larry, Kenneth, and I learned so much.







ONE Lexington Featured at Cities United's 11th Annual Convening:

On a personal note, only those working in this space, day in and day out, can truly understand the risk, stress, and continuous trauma you endure on a job like this. Sometimes you feel you are on an island... It was good to be around my brothers and sisters from across the country who understand the journey. We leaned on each other, encouraged each other, cried with each other, and supported each other last week and I needed that so much! I came back energized and ready to get back to work!











One Lexington & Community Partners Support Cardinal Valley Neighborhood:

With a spike in shootings in the Cardinal Valley area over the last month or so, One Lexington, Dunbar High School (along with other members of Fayette County Public Schools), members of public safety, other community partners from our violence prevention ecosystem, and neighbors who live in the neighborhood, all came to get together last week for a N.E.W. (Neighborhood Engagement Walks). Our goal today was to connect families affected by gun violence to resources, provide fresh food from Black Soil, and stand in solidarity with a community that oftentimes feels unheard. What happened today was so much more than what we could have ever expected. Over 100 community members of all ages came together for an impromptu prayer session led by the mother of a young man battling for his life due to gunshot injuries. Neighbors also began speaking out about what's going on in their neighborhoods, saying that they've "had enough!!" Unity and organizing began tonight and community partners will follow the lead of the residents as they build the next steps.







ONE Lexington Mentoring Group Featured On Good Morning America:

For the second time this year, a clip from One Lexington's weekly "It Takes a Village" In-School Mentoring Program went viral and caught the attention of national platforms such as **Good Morning America** and The Blackman. The clip now has over 5 million views collectively on social media and features a lesson about the importance of long & short-term goals. Our 6th-grade group at Edythe J. Hayes was excited to know, that people across the world were encouraging them to "do the work" and take life "one step at a time"! We have seen **youth and young adult homicides and shootings drop 60 percent over the last 2 years in Lexington,** and we credit some of that progress to our amazing partnership with Fayette County Public Schools where we currently facilitate 30 weekly in-school mentoring groups across the district. FREE Mental Health Support For Students & Families of Students Affected By Gun Violence:

This Summer, the Governor's office announced a half-a-million-dollar grant to One Lexington through the state's Everybody Counts program. We are utilizing this funding through our "Building Bridges to Opportunity" initiative, including expanded scholarship opportunities for students of color, skills scholarships for all students affected by gun violence, and more.



\$150,000 of that money has been set aside to supplement mental health costs for students, parents, and immediate family members affected by gun violence! That resource is available now!

One of the root causes and residual effects of gun violence is untreated trauma and mental health issues. Our ultimate goal with this program is "building" bridges to opportunity for our city's most vulnerable students. Due to financial disparities and the stigmatization of mental health, many communities who are affected by gun violence the most, lack access and opportunity to services.
